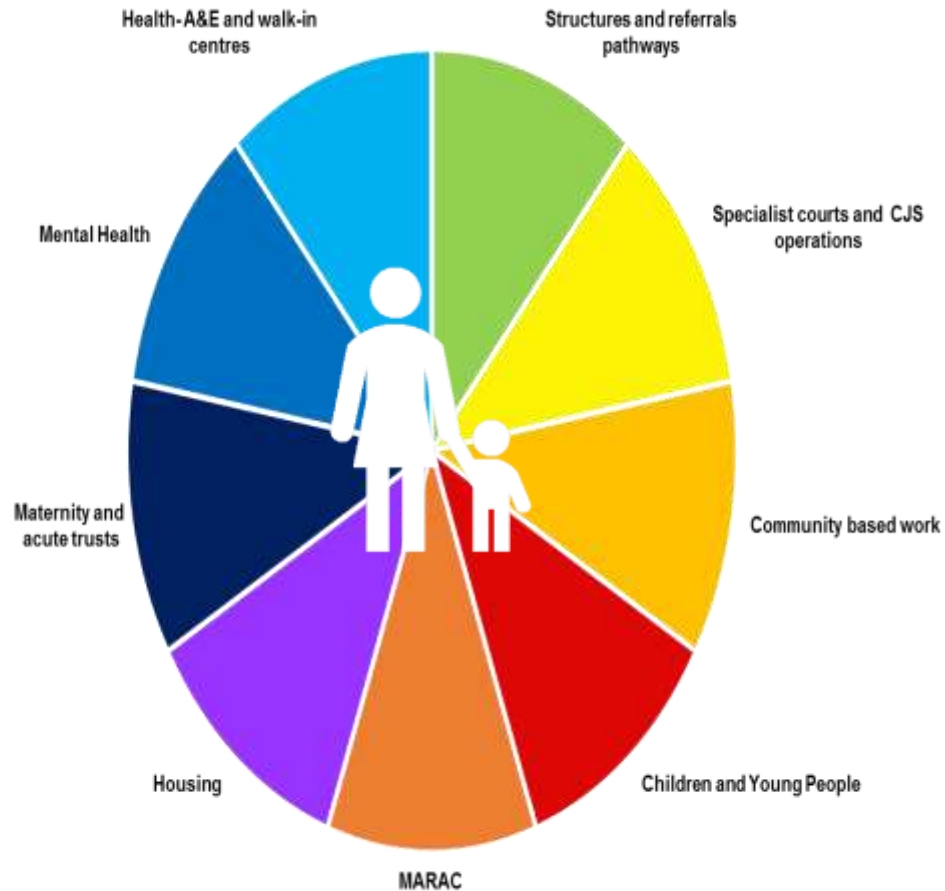


The Coordinated Community Response in the UK

- Over Twenty years experience of developing the model across the UK
- Practised the work locally and then expanded to national provision
- Key aim to support the woman and children and hold the perpetrator accountable.
- Every agency has a role to play
- The CCR enables a whole system response to a whole person. It shifts responsibility for safety away from individual survivors to the community and services existing to support them

- Domestic Abuse Commissioner holding government and agencies to account
- National network of Coordinators

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Training and support

- National accredited programme for coordinators working in UK
- CQ4DVCI enabled wider learning and engagement from European partners, welcomed by UK professionals.
- Homicides and suicides reviewed and any learning shared
- Implementation of Whole Housing and Whole Health Approaches
- Recognition of the vital role of specialist Women's services

What survivors tell us

- “You can’t have a VAWG response if you don’t know survivor’s experiences and what people need from the response.”
- ‘all work with all people affected by abuse and trauma needs to look unlike and be the opposite of abuse - otherwise it can inadvertently replicate the dynamics of abuse and cause harm
